Here are the all-important AGM reports from the Club's officers: Chairman Roger Hayes, Secretary Liz Barnett and Treasurer John Caunter

First, Chairman's Report from Roger Hayes

Good evening folks and thank you for taking the time to be here tonight, for what is our 40th AGM.

Although the club initially started in 1982, it was in July 1984 that the club was officially formed and the first AGM took place. The club has certainly grown/changed in so many different ways since then. This is my 30th year of being on the committee. Having had a front row seat, I think it's fair to say that I've witnessed most of those changes. You will see from tonight's agenda there are two resolutions for you to vote on, both are just minor tweaks to the constitution. There are also numerous vacant non-committee posts that remain unfilled. I will accept nominations from the floor in the hope that we can fill those roles. Healthy competition for roles is always a good thing, it's something I have actively encouraged over the years.

Sadly this year, like last year, no one other than the existing committee stood for any of the 13 positions available. Races up and down the country have generally struggled on the entries front, and our races were no exception last year. The DD got us underway in June. The race winner, a young whipper snapper at the tender age of 21, was running the DD for the first time. As was the first lady, who dipped under 4 hrs, and in doing so broke the female course record - making a £200 dent in the RD's final accounts! The Haytor Heller was sadly cancelled for only the third time in its 38 year history. Foot and Mouth disease and Covid accounted for two such times. Last year it was the weather. New guidelines have been put in place for Race Director's if such an occurrence should arise again. The only race to buck the trend of not selling out was our Totnes 10K. We hit our 625 race limit with a few days to spare. A fitting tribute to Bob Small who stood down from the role as RD after overseeing a very successful four years in the hot seat.

Last year saw new owners take over Dornafield after the Dewhirt family sold up. Although the Ladies 10K went smoothly and was a great success, the Caravan & Motorhome Club (who bought the business) felt they couldn't accommodate us again. A new course and Race HQ has since been found and I think the future looks bright for the race. The switch from November to October for the Sibelco Templer Ten certainly paid dividends so far as the weather was concerned. A glorious day helped ensure another great Trotter event. I am a strong believer in the powers of social media. I see it as the main way forward to promote our races and try to get them full.

My thanks to those who shared my posts promoting our races during the course of last year. However, despite numerous pleas, it was sadly only a small hard core of you who did - over 200 of you in our Facebook group didn't! Going forward, please make it your business to share posts promoting our races. The simple fact is, if we don't fill them then our membership fees will continue to rise, as our races are our only real source of income. My thanks to everyone who helped out at any of our races last year.

Special thanks to Bon, Bob and Jason, who's last year it was as Race Directors. My highlight of 2023 was undoubtably the formal introduction of the Couch to 5K. Whereas before we had a beginners group with very little structure, we now have a highly successful programme in place. The three start dates within a year, allows us to promote those 12 week courses. We're very lucky to have John Skinner as the groups leader. He does an amazing job, making light work of something that's not easy. We're noticing more and more members from his groups are joining the club, which can only be a good thing. Our coaching team saw quite a few comings and goings last year. Thankfully with those that joined our team, we were, and still are, able to offer a great selection of twice weekly sessions. My thanks to all those involved.

Congratulations to our Club Champions; Jacki Woon and Roger Easterbrook, and to all those that won an award last year. We had nothing but good feedback from staging it at Finlake for the first time, so much so that we're going back there again this year - so get the 14th December in your diaries! I'm hoping to make the inter club cricket and rounders social day, an annual event at the Rec, such was the success last year. Who could forget those winning runs off the last ball. Our club captains did a marvellous job in rallying the troops for the various relay events we took part in. If you've never run one before, you should give it a go, they really are great fun. Please remember the committee are always open to fresh ideas and suggestions, such as the one Bob Small brought to us regarding his series of lectures. It's been a pleasure serving you as Chairman and I look forward to doing it again this year.

Next is Club Secretary's report from Liz Barnett

Good evening everyone and thanks for attending this year's Annual General Meeting.

As with previous years, we have continued to be affiliated as a Club to both England Athletics and the Association of Running Clubs.

Committee meetings have had good attendance this year, as you will have seen in the attendance record sent out with tonight's Agenda.

In November we held our annual Race Directors Meeting. This meeting gives all our Race Directors and the Assistant Race Directors the opportunity to discuss any issues and share good practices.

Unfortunately, the Club was not granted a place for this year's London Marathon. As always, the number of places allocated is based on how many registered England Athletics members the Club has. However, the criteria have changed and with the number of registered athletes we had at the cut-off date in July, we were entered into a draw with a 50% chance of winning a place. If, in future years, we have 40 or more registered athletes by the cut-off date, we will go back to receiving one place.

Club Camp 2023 was at Trevornick Holiday Park, Holywell Bay just outside Newquay. It was a fantastic venue and a great time was had by all. Club Camp 2024 will be on $14^{th}/15^{th}$ June at Holiday Resort Unity, Brean Sands, Somerset; details are on our Facebook page and will also be in the next edition of The Trotter.

There was no foreign marathon trip in 2023 but for 2024 we're going to Rome in March.

As always, I'd like to thank my fellow Officers and Committee members for their continued support during my eighth year as Club Secretary.

And finally, Treasurer's report from John Caunter

Good evening everyone.

As last year I will keep my report short, as you all should have eyes on the balance sheet.

Starting with the bottom of sheet 2 you can see the club made a loss in 2023 of £2106. The breakdown of our funds are listed just above, and above that our balances, from which you can see that we ended 2023 with just over £62.5k in accessible funds. At the top are the figures for our races. As you can see 4 of our 2023 races made a profit (the Haytor Heller was cancelled due to the weather) although not all the income/expenditure was in 2023, as can be seen from the top of sheet 1, which details where we spent our money, and acquired our income, along with the actual financial entries for races in the calendar year. Although the income and expenditure figures do vary from year to year there isn't anything which I think I need to highlight, but as I stated earlier, I am more than happy to discuss any aspect.

The club has assets in 2 areas which are Club Kit and the value of all equipment we hold at Brunel, Dartmoor and various houses! Club kit in stock, at the end of 2023 was £3670 (£3675 last year). The value of all the other equipment we hold, amounts to approx. £26.25k, the total being approx. £30k. My thanks to Nathan and Jacki for providing these figures.

My thanks to the officers and committee for their support during the last 12 months, and to wish the club and all its members every success in 2024.

I will now answer any questions you may have, after which will come my proposal for membership fees for 2024-25.

I think it would be wise to increase our fees, as they have been unchanged since 2016. With government inflation figures the new fees would be £32, £53, £74 & £90. However, my proposal is £28, £48, £68 & £80. It is worth mentioning that in 2016 we were paying £30 per member to NADRT and we now pay £36 per member.
